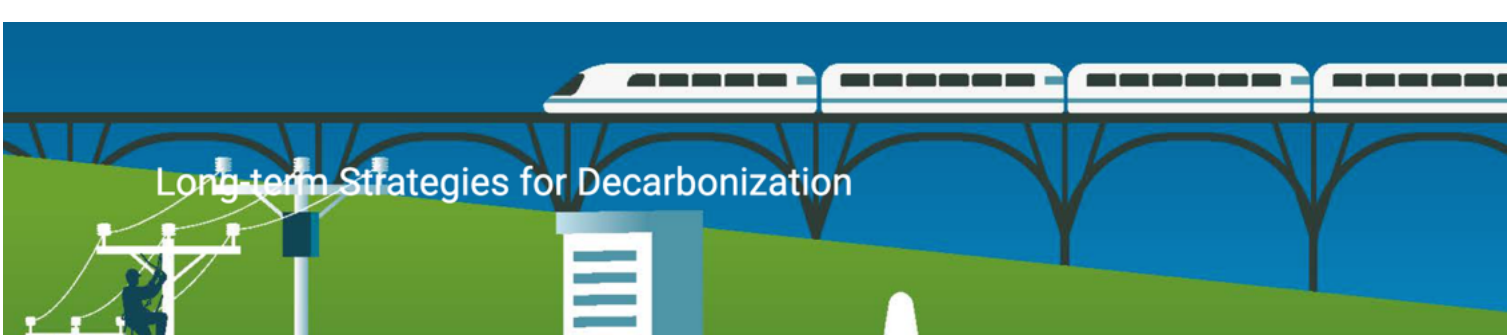

New UNEP report: What do national pathways tell us about reaching net zero?

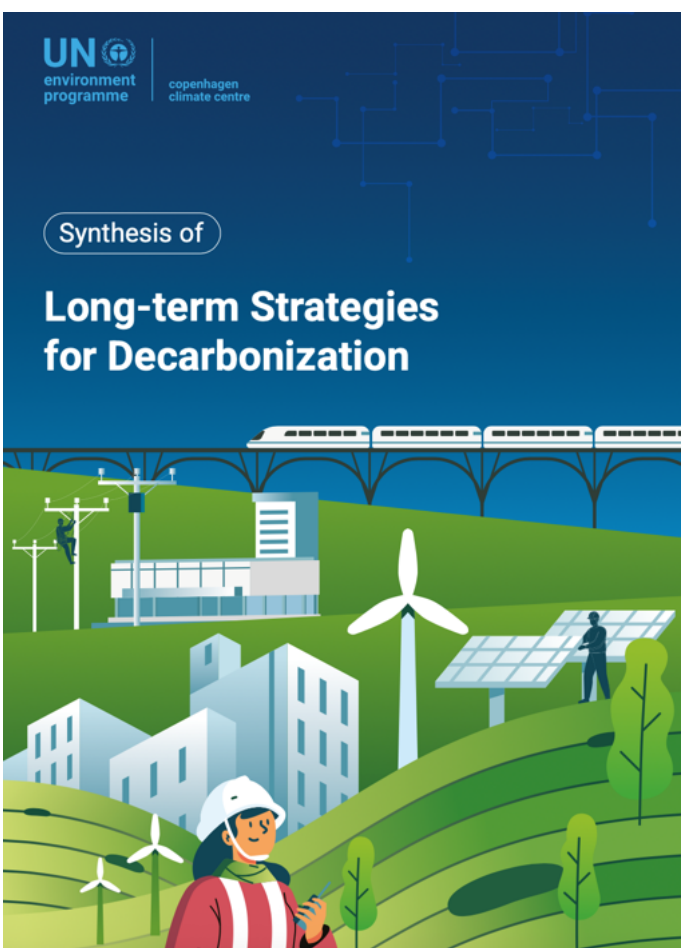


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From long-term ambition to real-world transformation: insights from UNEP's new synthesis report

DDP contribution: National pathways to net zero

The Deep Decarbonization Pathways initiative (DDP), coordinated by IDDRI and partners, led Chapter 3 of the report: “National Pathways to Net Zero: Key Characteristics and Policy Insights”, building on insights from the DDP’s recent annual reports and drawing together evidence from detailed national decarbonization pathways developed across the network.

The chapter synthesises findings from the **DDP Annual Report 2024**, which explored national transition strategies towards carbon neutrality across countries and sectors, and the **DDP Report 2025**, which assessed progress, emerging challenges and opportunities across national climate action over the past decade. By bringing these insights together, Chapter 3 highlights not only where countries are heading, but what immediate actions, structural shifts and international cooperation are needed to turn long-term ambitions into implementable pathways.

Key insights from the DDP-led Chapter 3

The chapter highlights that reaching net zero is not simply about setting end goals, it requires integrated policy packages that connect immediate action with long-term structural change.

Net zero requires acting now while preparing for long-term transformation. Countries need to accelerate emissions reductions where low-carbon solutions are already available — particularly in power, transport and land use — while simultaneously investing in the infrastructure, institutions and technologies needed for deeper reductions over time. Policy packages are also needed to address the socio-economic challenges of the transition, guarding against price shocks that undermine the affordability of essential services and supporting the structural changes required in the industrial system.

The chapter also highlights three key requirements for net-zero transitions

1. Fossil fuel dependence must decline, and this can be done in a way that supports development.

Across national pathways, DDP finds a consistent pattern: achieving net zero depends on a sustained reduction in direct fossil fuel use, large-scale electrification, and managing economic transitions in ways that support development priorities and social outcomes. The report notes that carbon capture and storage is expected to play a more limited role than direct reductions in fossil fuel dependence.

2. Maximizing carbon sinks in land use is essential.

National pathways highlight the important role of carbon sinks in land-use and forestry sectors to balance residual emissions that remain in hard-to-abate sectors. But expanding sinks cannot come at the expense of other development priorities: country-specific approaches are needed to safeguard food systems, support rural economies, strengthen resilience and protect biodiversity.

3. International cooperation remains crucial.

National transitions cannot happen in isolation. Finance, technology cooperation and trade arrangements will play a critical role in enabling countries to pursue transitions aligned with their own national development strategies and priorities.

Why this matters now

As countries prepare updates to their climate and development strategies, the report reinforces a central DDP message: long-term planning is not separate from near-term action. National pathways analysis provides an essential benchmark for assessing whether current commitments, policies and investment decisions are genuinely aligned with long-term climate and development goals. Effective transitions depend on aligning development objectives, investment decisions and climate goals through credible, country-driven pathways.

Importantly, ambition cannot be measured through emissions trends alone. Assessing progress towards carbon neutrality requires a deeper examination of whether countries are advancing the profound transformations needed across energy systems, infrastructure, industry, land use, institutions and socio-economic systems.

By bringing together evidence from national pathways, the report highlights that effective transitions depend not only on setting targets, but on understanding the pace, sequencing and structural changes required to deliver them. Achieving net zero is therefore as much a governance and transformation challenge as it is a technological one — requiring credible long-term strategies, coordinated institutions and sustained policy action across all levels of decision-making.
